

Additional Fees for Non-U.S. Residents at 11 U.S. National Parks

Pursuant to relevant U.S. government administrative policies and the latest official regulations implemented by the U.S. National Park System, starting January 1, 2026, 11 U.S. national parks will impose a unified additional entry fee on non-U.S. residents. This policy is an administrative regulation at the U.S. national park level, not formulated by travel agencies or local operators. The relevant policy details and implementation instructions of our company are as follows:

I. Policy Overview

1. This fee adjustment is initiated by the U.S. government and implemented by the National Park Service (NPS) as an official regulation applicable to all eligible visitors. The fee is not included in tour quotations or pre-determined mandatory items and must be paid separately.

2. Eligible Visitors & Age Requirements

- Applicable persons: Non-U.S. residents (visitors unable to present a U.S. passport, driver's license or ID card issued by any U.S. state or territory, or U.S. Permanent Resident Card (Green Card))

- Age requirement: 16 years of age or older
- Charging method: Per capita, individual fee

3. Specific Fee Rates

- Starting January 1, 2026, non-U.S. residents entering designated national parks shall pay a ****non-resident surcharge**** in addition to the regular park entry

fee.

- Non-resident surcharge rate: USD \$100 per person per national park (for those aged 16 and above)

4. The 11 national parks covered are:

- Grand Canyon National Park
- Yellowstone National Park
- Yosemite National Park
- Zion National Park
- Grand Teton National Park
- Glacier National Park
- Rocky Mountain National Park
- Bryce Canyon National Park
- Acadia National Park
- Sequoia and Kings Canyon National Parks
- Everglades National Park

II. Instructions for Park Entry & Payment Under This Policy

For itineraries including the above national parks, non-U.S. resident visitors may comply with entry and fee requirements in either of the following two ways:

1. Visitors may pay the non-resident surcharge on-site upon entering the relevant national park, at the rate of USD \$100 per person per park (for those aged 16 and above).

2. Visitors may also choose the Non-Resident National Park Annual Pass offered by the U.S. National Park System as an eligible payment method for entry.

- The Non-Resident National Park Annual Pass is an official annual pass option launched by the U.S. National Park System for non-U.S. residents, priced at \$250 per person per year, valid for one year from the date of purchase. Visitors holding a valid Non-Resident National Park Annual Pass are exempt from the single non-resident surcharge when entering relevant national parks during the pass validity period.

- The pass covers the non-resident surcharge for the pass holder and up to three accompanying persons aged 16 or older, subject to on-site enforcement by national park authorities.

- The Non-Resident National Park Annual Pass may be purchased by visitors directly through official channels designated by the National Park Service. The official ticketing platform is: <https://www.recreation.gov/interagency-pass/types/nonresident>. Specific purchasing procedures, usage terms, and implementation details are subject to current announcements by the U.S. National Park System.

3. The above non-U.S. resident surcharge is a policy-based fee uniformly implemented by the National Park System. Our company ****does not collect this fee in advance**** and it is ****not included**** in our quotations or mandatory ticket fees. Eligible visitors may choose the appropriate payment method on their own.

III. Important Notes

- Park staff may verify visitors' identities in accordance with management regulations during ticket purchase or entry. Please ensure you understand the relevant policies before registration and departure and carry valid identification documents.
